• FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY: FROM DIRTY HARRY TO MARTIN BUBER TO YOU

In the 1983 film, *Sudden Impact*, a plainclothes San Francisco police officer named Harry Callahan (Clint Eastwood) confronts a robber holding a waitress hostage with a gun to her head. Instead of backing off, "Dirty Harry" points his large revolver at the robber's face.

Conveying he'd be more than pleased to mortally dispatch the miscreant if any harm came to the waitress, Callahan warns him by saying, "Go ahead, make my day." The American Film Institute ranks this line as the sixth most notable in cinematic history. "Make my day" has become popular around the world. However, now most of the time the famous phrase possesses a somewhat different connotation. Rather than implying a threat, the words more often convey appreciation. When one person provides another with an unexpected kindness or otherwise gratifying interface, he or she often acknowledges it with an enthused, "You made my day."

During one of his February presentations, TBI Scholar-in-Residence Dr. David Ellenson referred to Martin Buber's contrast of I-it and I-Thou relationships. The former are generally characterized by studied practicality, dry routine and an absence of spontaneity. Depending on the situation, I-it can be regarded in positive or negative terms. An individual undergoing heart surgery wants his surgeon to focus single mindedly on the task at hand, not seek to joke around or pursue avuncular conversations with assisting nurses and hospital staff.

In this case, an I-it orientation is very important to maintain. But in other circumstances, I-it relationships can reveal a failure to engage in authentic communication. When husbands and wives, for example, simply go through the motions of marriage for long periods of time without any natural, uncontrived interactions their union can devolve into an unfulfilling I-it relationship. I-Thou interactions are inclined toward more improvised, less prosaic exchange. Individuals are able to see beyond purely functional roles and genuinely experience real dialogue with one another. Though sometimes lasting only a moment, these encounters nonetheless point to a penetrating consciousness of mutuality and the Creator (the Thou) that makes it possible.

At a time of increasing social isolation, such occasions confirm our humanity and capacity for empathy. Interestingly, they do not have to include speech. At certain times, merely a knowing glance can bring about an I-Thou sense of presence. Buber wrote how just a simple smile could vitalize those working in factories and office environments where limited opportunities for true personal engagement exist.

Hasidism's monumental contribution to Jewish life is seen in its effort to cultivate greater opportunities for I-Thou experiences. This explains why Buber devoted so much of his scholarship to Hasidic teachings and practices.

We make someone's day, i.e. engender I-Thou encounters, by introducing elements into our everyday interactions that help elevate the spirit. In offering a compliment, sharing a stimulating aside, injecting humor or expressing sincere concern about another's welfare human value is conferred. When this happens ordinarily mundane transactions (such as routinely occur in highly bureaucratic settings or at the grocery store, bank, etc.) are transformed into what Buber called genuine "meetings." This positive chemistry of relation points to both a transcendent, yet immanent Thou.

For Buber, the importance of these meetings cannot be underestimated as they heighten selfvalue, confidence and esteem. In many respects this is, essentially, where Tikkun Olam begins. I enjoy making people's days and having my own made by them. Sometimes, making another individual's day doesn't even require an actual physical encounter to occur. For instance, I delight in hearing about when someone in a restaurant anonymously purchases the meal of another. Perhaps, the recipient is a veteran or a family that appears to be in need. So too, when I send a donation to a worthy organization, I know that when the envelope is opened I have helped make the day of those that lead it.

In other words, we can make someone's day, partake in I-Thou, through tzedekah too. According to our sages, tzedakah bring us closer to God by shedding the illusion that we exist only as entities onto ourselves. Therefore, I take this opportunity to encourage you to try to make someone's day not only through personal relation but, perhaps, the purse as well.

There are a host of organizations whose day you possess the power to make with your generosity. Seek them out, surprise them with your interest and support. Create an I-Thou moment by providing resources they never expected to receive. This could also certainly include TBI. In making someone else's day by way of a pleasing encounter or material support, I contend we also ineluctably make God's day as well.

REFORM JUDAISM IN ISRAEL NEEDS YOUR VOTE

Reform Judaism has made impressive strides in Israel in recent years. Our movement has fought for greater religious freedom, women's rights and on behalf of socio-cultural tolerance. But, while there have been significant victories, many obstacles still stand in the way. That's why voting in the **2015 World Zionist Organization (WZO)** elections is so important. Elected members of the **WZO** Congress shape the agenda, policies and leadership of a range of issues vitally important to the Reform Movement. In allocating hundreds of millions of dollars in funding, **WZO** decisions affect the status of Reform Jews in Israel and across the world.

The **WZO Congress** is composed of 757 delegates representing organizations like Hadassah, B'nai B'rith, and the World Union for Progressive Judaism. The remaining 525 delegates represent the Israelis and Diaspora communities. American Reform Jews need to vote for the **ARZA** (Association of Reform Zionists of America) slate in the election. Currently, **ARZA** (i.e. the Reform Movement), controls 56 of the United States' 145 seats, representing 39% of the delegates. The goal is to increase the number of seats to 50% of the U.S. delegation, the maximum number permitted under the rules of the election.

Voting is easy. Just go online to **ReformJews4Israel.org** and follow the directions. The only requirement is that you are Jewish, over 18, and a U.S. resident. A processing fee of \$10 is required to offset the cost of conducting the election. **Voting has begun and continues through April 30 2015**, please don't wait to participate. Also, share this information with others who may not be members of **TBI** so they too can vote. We must take advantage of this opportunity increase the profile and leverage of Reform Judaism in Israel and around the world.

"WHAT IS HAPPENING IN ISRAEL TODAY: WHAT IS THE FUTURE OF THE JEWISH PEOPLE"

There is turmoil in the Middle East; we watch television news reports of it every day. And, whether we like it or not, the State and people of Israel are always a major part of the mix. Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and his Likud Party have created the need for early elections. The voting will take place on March 17th and, as if that wasn't enough, we are also in the midst of the World Zionist Congress Elections (and we hope that every member of Temple Beth Israel will register to vote for the ARZA slate, the Zionist arm of North American Reform Judaism) which will determine just how funding is given to the various Jewish streams in Israel through the Jewish Agency.

How fortunate we are to be able to welcome to our congregation and community one of the leaders of Reform Judaism in Israel, Dr. Michael Marmur, the Jack, Joseph and Morton Mandel Provost of the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, who will serve as our "interpreter" of the new political landscape that will be the 20th K'nesset, who's leaders will take Israel on its newest journey into its – and our own - future.

Born and raised in England, Michael Marmur completed a BA Degree in Modern History at the University of Oxford before moving to Israel in 1984. While studying for an MA in Ancient Jewish History at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, he completed his studies in the Israel Rabbinic Program of HUC-Jerusalem, becoming ordained in 1992. For six years following his ordination he served as a congregational rabbi, high school teacher and member of the executive committee at the Leo Baeck Education Center in Haifa, Michael Marmur's Ph.D Dissertation at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem was entitled "Heschel's Rhetoric of Citation: The Use of Sources in God In Search of Man." Rabbi Marmur has lectured and taught extensively in North America and Israel, and also in many parts of Western and Central Europe.

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
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
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LEARN HOW TO SAVE A LIFE

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
