

For Temple Beth Israel to live, we need a new generation of members who will show the kind of vision, dedication, and passion for a Jewish community on Longboat Key that the Founders manifested.

Many of the tasks that they took on are tasks they can no longer be expected to continue. INTUITION by Allegra Goodman

A new novel by Allegra Goodman, the New Yorker, National Book Award finalist has written a new book of mystery and rich human drama set in a prestigious research institute in Cambridge, Massachusetts.

Co-directors of a lab, where cancer research is being done, are in desperate need of a grant.

With unusual insight the author weaves a story of intrigue, scientific ardor and moral consequences. The discovery of a virus that fights cancer is made by one of the characters in the novel. However the findings are suspect and the resulting inquiry spins out of control. Where is the truth and what is the motive?

The word "intuition" means something different to each of us. How is it used in this novel? Which characters display it? How?? This novel is set in the mid-1980s. How does this fit into the story? Would it be different if the setting was today?

The world of labs and researchers is unfamiliar to many of us, but it is relevant to our very existence.

The well drawn characters give us insight into the complexity of relationships in the world of research

and the politics that emanate from their work.
