Beginning with the installation of our new administration in June, and inspired by the leadership of the past administration led by **Kathy Brooks**, a new spirit of enthusiasm has begun to emerge. Over the summer months a number of very positive actions have been taken. Foremost is the installation of our new **Rabbi, Stephen L. Sniderman**, and the addition of **Isaac Azerad** as our new Executive Director.

A major objective in the coming months will be to attract new members. We have a lot to offer to the more than 1500 unaffiliated Jewish residents on Longboat Key, as well as to many residents of the Sarasota community. As a congregation dominated by senior citizens, we are unique in offering a wide array of educational and social programs that appeal to that element of the community. Under the leadership of our Membership Committee Chairman **Murray Blueglass**, a vigorous program of new membership recruitment is under way. In the few short months since its inception, the program has already yielded ten new member units. Keep in mind that the ultimate success of this program, and a renewed growth of our congregation, is highly dependent on the active participation of all of our members. As we move forward together, I feel very confident that happy days are ahead.

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

As I was unpacking a box of books, I rediscovered something I had forgotten about. Over the years I have managed to collect several European Reform prayer books. They have not been easy to find, to say the least. I have, for example, the third edition, published in 1924,

of the High Holiday prayer book from the New Synagogue in Danzig. It was common for each congregation to have its own prayer book.

Each Reform prayer book has its own special flavor, as we so well know if we think for a moment about the differences between the *Union Prayer Book* and *Mishkan T'fillah*. In addition, each individual volume can have something special about it. We can imagine shelves of the same book with each book having its individual characteristics. We could be talking about an owner's signature, a congregation's bookplate, or an insert.

I had forgotten that folded inside my *Danzig High Holiday prayer book* was a piece of paper. It is a carbon copy of a cue sheet indicating when the Cantor and choir would sing for the morning service on Yom Kippur. I do not have any evidence to tell me who owned this book or in what year the cue sheet was put together. The most I can say is that I acquired it at a Brandeis Book Sale in Chicago in the early 1980s.

How many times we have thrown away the programs, inserts, or anything else that we find in old books! The carbon copy of this cue sheet so easily could have been lost. While the prayer book is a treasure, the cue sheet is a special treasure. I am going to try to see if I can find out more about it.

This story has contemporary relevance. The same day I unpacked the book and rediscovered that page was a day when I reviewed cue sheets for the High Holiday services here.

The Cantor and the choir from Danzig are no longer with us. Their prayer book took on a new life as I reviewed its contents. Perhaps it would be better for me to say that I prayed its prayers. The cue sheet added a far more powerful note. (Pun intended.) I don't know whose it was, but let me imagine the Cantor or a choir member unfolding it during a rehearsal or a service.

May I be a worthy custodian of these treasures! As we prepare for the High Holidays may all of us be worthy custodians of our heritage.

You will be notified and asked to create a unique password that will allow you to access the directory online from anywhere in the world.

You have recently been asked to select one of two **TBI** color logos. Your response as always is greatly appreciated. After due consideration our Board and leadership decided to remain faithful to our initial logo. There is something to be admired about loyalty to the symbol of our identity.

At the suggestion of **Linda Albert**, who has contributed to the project, our Board voted to create permanent name tags for our membership. The name tags are color coded to allow everyone to be identified by name as members, as new members, or as visitors.

The magnetic fastener allows easy wear and is safe on clothing. This will also help our **Rabbi** learn the members' names. The name tags will be handed to you at the entrance to the sanctuary or the social hall at each Temple event. I urge you to return the name tags after each event or service in order to have them available for you the next time you come to Temple. Thank you **Kathy Brooks** for seeing this project to fruition.

As we advance into the new digital age we are urged to consider the advantages it has to offer. Many have requested the option of online registration for Temple events, dinners and programs. The advantages of a simple and easy online registration will allow for convenient, secure credit card payment. Our website is now secured by **SiteLock Secure**, a utility that analyses and certifies security on a daily basis. Look for their logo on the bottom of our web page.

Registering online is easy as 1, 2 and 3:


- 1. Click the link to the event listing - you will be taken to a registration form.**




